Year 7 Catch-up funding Expenditure

Academic Year 2017-18

Introduction

The literacy and numeracy catch-up premium gives schools additional funding to support year 7 pupils who did not achieve the expected standard in reading or maths at the end of key stage 2 (KS2).

Purpose of the catch-up funding

Schools should identify pupils who need extra support from the year 7 catch-up premium, so they can decide the best way to use the funding. They should only select programmes and approaches that you know are effective.

For example, they could use the funding to pay for:

- individual tuition
- intensive small-group tuition
- external services and materials
- academically focused summer schools that help students catch up over a short period of time through intensive expert tuition

Writing - 48 pupils did not get expected standard in their SATs and remained at Walkwood for year 7. Of these 48, 22 are SEND. At the end of year 7, 83% of the 48 pupils have made expected or greater progress. 5 pupils (10%) are now working at national expectation and 11 (23%) are now at 7 Developing.

English Workshop- The Story Spinner	£400	On World Book Day (Thursday o1/03/18), Storyspinner and writer Phil McDermott will visit school for the day to deliver workshops to year 7 pupils. Maths:

- 67 pupils did not get expected standard in their SATs and remained at Walkwood for year 7. Of these 67, 25 are SEND.
- At the end of year 7, 90% of the 67 pupils have made expected or greater progress.
- Of the 67 pupils who did not achieve expected standard in their SATs, 19 pupils (28%) have made greater than expected progress this year.
- Of the 25 SEND pupils, 92% made expected or greater progress during year 7 and 24% made greater than expected progress.

Reading:





- 55 pupils did not get expected standard in their SATs and remained at Walkwood for year 7. Of these 50, 21 are SEND.
- At the end of year 7, 82% of the 55 pupils have made expected or greater progress.
- Of the 55 pupils who did not achieve expected standard in their SATs, 14 pupils (25%) have made greater than expected progress this year.
- Of the 21 SEND pupils, 76% made expected or greater progress during year 7 and 19% made greater than expected progress.

Writing:

- 48 pupils did not get expected standard in their SATs and remained at Walkwood for year 7. Of these 48, 22 are SEND.
- At the end of year 7, 83% of the 48 pupils have made expected or greater progress.
- Of the 48 pupils who did not achieve expected standard in their SATs, 19 pupils (40%) have made greater than expected progress this year.
- Of the 22 SEND pupils, 77% made expected or greater progress during year 7 and 36% made greater than expected progress.
