Dear Parents and Carers,

Another busy week for us started with a visit from Councillor Marcus Hart. He took a tour of our school with two members of the Pupil Leadership Team and was able to speak with me about education and Walkwood's approach. It was a valuable time for both of us.

The application process for members of next year's Pupil Leadership Team has begun, with potential prefects, College Captains and Head Boy and Head Girl placing letters into the hands of specific staff. Not all applicants will go through to the next round, which for the College Captains, Head Boy and Head Girl are interviews with staff. I know that the quality of applications for the latter two posts has been very high indeed, and a good number for both, which has made selection tricky.

Wednesday was a Deep Day, where the different Colleges have considered Bible stories but carrying out work which looks at what the stories may mean to us. Abberley studied the passage which tells of Jesus calming of the storm, while Cleeve looked at the transfiguration (when Jesus went to a mountain). Malvern worked with the idea of baptism, and Bredon considered the parable of the sower of seeds (we also use this at Harvest time).

The two Arts Days have allowed the pupils to work in year groups on projects that have included designing, cooking, painting and other art, as well as music.

When you read this I will have returned with some of Year 8 who have visited London, along with Mrs Hands and Mrs Russell. We have done lots of walking, been to the top of St. Paul's Cathedral and seen two very different shows - the musical Matilda, and The Play That Goes Wrong (which it did, all the way through, to lots of laughter!). Other members of Year 8 will be off to Snowdonia with Mr Jenkin and Mr Hunt. One hundred members of Year 5 are also in Wales, albeit in the Brecon Beacons, looked after by Mrs Cull and Mr Macdonald, amongst others.

Many of our activities involve staff giving additional time to organising or delivering the events, on top of their teaching or support of learning. Certainly, educational visits are 'extras' which would not be possible without the voluntary time given by Walkwood colleagues, and I appreciate very much what they give.



#### Pupils make good progress

during their time at school. A well-taught and broad curriculum ensures that most pupils work at or above age-related expectations.



That is one of the sentences in the Ofsted report for our school. Behind it is something rather brave - here at Walk wood we do train pupils to complete their SATs, but rather we look for them to have a wide range of subjects through out their time with us.

Of course, that does not mean we ignore SATs. We prepare pupils through their English and Mathematics lessons, and change only a few times in order to ensure pupils do not get stressed. The children have other subjects that use different skills, so they have variety during the day. This is a benefit from a middle school that has its pupils moving around the building.



In the coming weeks, pupils in all years will take some assessments. These are matched against other pupils of the same year group across the country. The tests allow us to know how much progress that our pupils are making.

It is because of these assessments that we know that around 85% of Walkwood pupils leave our school working at standards that are above their age in English and Mathematics.

Please remember that it is not just about 'the results' for pupils. Even at GCSE and above, it is about how students think, behave and respond. Ofsted said:

"Many teachers balance the development of pupils' subject knowledge, skills for learning and positive attitudes very skilfully. They blend the lesson objectives with the development of 'superhero learning traits' and promote pupils' understanding of the 'fruits of faith'."



"During their time at school, pupils develop into confident, hardworking and articulate pupils. They acquire good social skills, develop tolerance of others and are resilient."




#### **LEST WE FORGET**



Hello, my name is Abigail Salcombe - I am writing this to tell you about my life as a swimmer. I do loads of training throughout the week. I train 6 days a week: Monday 2 hours, Tuesday 2 hours, Wednesday 2 hours, Thursday 1 hour,

Friday morning 1 hour, Sunday 2 hours. On Monday I swim at Bromsgrove Private School. On Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, I swim at Everyone Active. On Sunday morning I swim at Birmingham University. The sets we do are extremely hard - we do over 5000m every night. Every Friday morning we do over 2000m. I have been swimming for approximately 6 years.

In 2017 I went to my very first County swimming event. This was a very big thing as I had never been before so I was nervous and excited to compete. I had 3 races to compete in and I am proud to say I did very well. This year I went to my second County competition. It was a lot more full on this year as I had 11 races, however I am proud to say again that I did very well.

A couple of months ago I went to Regionals for the first time and I had 2 events to race. At Regionals it is harder than County because the times are much faster and the swimmers practice a lot more. However, I gave my all and got times I was very happy with.



My 3 favourite medals are my Silver County Medal, Gold City of Gloucester and Gold Stoke- on-Trent medals. When I'm older I want to compete in the Commonwealth Games and in the Olympics in 2022.


