Dear Parents and Carers,

The application process for members of next year's Pupil Leadership Team closed this week, with potential prefects, College Captains and Head Boy and Head Girl placing letters into the hands of specific staff. Not all applicants will go through to the next round, which for the College Captains, Head Boy and Head Girl there are interviews by staff.



Wednesday was a Deep Day, where the different Colleges have considered Bible stories but carrying out work which looks at what the stories may mean to us. Malvern studied the passage which tells of Jesus calming the storm, while Bredon looked at the transfiguration (when Jesus went up a mountain to talk with God). Cleeve College worked with the idea of baptism, and Abberley considered the parable of the sower of seeds (we also use this at Harvest time).

The two Arts Days on Thursday and Friday have allowed the pupils to work in year groups on projects that have specific parts of the world as the theme. Year 5 looked at aspects of Africa, with drums, dance and designing around the gecko. Year 6 used different artists and forms to consider self-expression, such as linking personal descriptive words into a thumb print. Year 7 focused on aspects of South America, once again encompassing music and dance, but also bringing in the habitats and animals of that part of the continent. Finally, Year 8's country of focus has been China, where food, games and terracotta warriors were to the fore.

When you read this I will be with five colleagues and a large number of Year 8s in London. We experience two very different shows - the musical Matilda, and The Play That Goes Wrong. One hundred members of Year 5 are in Wales, actually in the Brecon Beacons, looked after by Mr Macdonald, amongst others. Finally, Year 7 and some of Year 8 are headed to the Isle of Wight for very watery activities.

Many of our activities involve staff giving additional time to organising or delivering the events, on top of their teaching or support of learning. Certainly, educational visits are 'extras' which would not be possible without the voluntary time given by Walkwood colleagues, and I appreciate very much what they give.



Bredon – Transfiguration

Matt. Ch.17, v.1-9 – Jesus takes three of his disciples up to a high mountain where Jesus 'transfigures' before them. His face shines like the sun and his clothes become white as the light. Moses and Elijah also appear and start talking to Jesus. The disciples are shocked at this, but Jesus asks them not to say anything about it. Moses represents the law and Elijah represents the prophets.

What is the story of the transfiguration? Who were Moses and Elijah? Why are they important in the story? What is the symbolism of the story? What questions would we ask the people in the story? How can I make changes in my life? What do I need to do to transform my life?

Cleeve – The Baptism

Matt. Ch 3, v.13-17 – Jesus comes to the River Jordan to be baptised by John the Baptist. John says he is unworthy to even untie his sandals let alone baptise him but he does it anyway. When Jesus comes out of the water, the heavens open and the spirit in the shape of a dove descends on him. Baptism is a symbol of renewal, starting again, washing away and forgiveness of sins and coming into a new life with Christ.

What is baptism? How did Jesus get baptised and by whom? Why did Jesus need to get baptised? What is the symbolism of baptism today? Who do we belong to? How does it feel to belong to a group? Why do we do certain things in life?

Malvern - Calming the Storm

Matt. Ch. 8, v.23-27 – Jesus and his disciples are on a boat. Jesus is asleep when, without warning, a furious storm starts. The disciples wake him asking for him to help them. Jesus says that the disciples have little faith; he gets up and rebukes the waves making it calm again. The disciples are amazed that even the wind and the waves obey him.

What is the story of the calming of the storm? Why were the disciples worried? Why did they not have faith in Jesus? How does this change the opinions of the disciples about Jesus? What is the symbolism of the story? What questions would we ask the people in the story? How can I face my fears? What do I need to do to stay calm and not stress or worry in my life?

Abberley – The Sower of the Seed

Matt. Ch. 13, v.1-23 – Jesus tells a large crowd a parable about sowing seed. The seed is the message of God:
On the path – the devil can easily snatch it away
On rocky ground – it has no roots so it only lasts a short time
On thorny ground – the deceitfulness of life chokes it
On good soil – it produces good crops

What is the story of the Sower and the Seed? Why did Jesus tell this story? What is the symbolism behind the story? What type of seed am I? What do I need to do in life to change and be a better person?




