Dear Parents and Carers,

There has been a smooth start to the new school year. The first day included photographs for all pupils, proofs will be sent out once received back from the photographers, and Year 5 went to The Bridge Church for a welcome service led by Father Glenn. Wednesday involved Hustings where Year 8 pupils who wish to be part of the Pupil Leadership Team gave a speech to seek support from their peers, and the pupils and staff then voted. The results were part of the assembly on Friday afternoon. The voting was for College Captains and Vice Captains, as well as for Head Girl and Head Boy.

We have been spending money on the school site, having 'saved up' over the last three years or so. New chairs and tables are now in classrooms, with many places also having new carpet (the old ones were fraying or would no longer stick down). The playground fences have been replaced with much stronger mere-mesh, so the hope is that these contain the footballs at lunch much better! The playground for the older children was not quite finished at the start of the week, and they have been very understanding and patient with the temporary fencing.



Within this Insider you will find some headlines from our <u>Ofsted inspection</u> in mid-June. As you will not be surprised to learn, Walkwood continues to be a good school. There are many positives within the report, particularly how the ethos of the school supports pupils (as well as staff), the effect being that pupils are safe and are achieving well because the

















Preparing the ground



Inspection headlines

The school's ethos and values are central to every aspect of school life.

Relationships between pupils and teachers are strong. Pupils enjoy their learning. They say that their teachers care about them and help them to do their best.

Staff know pupils well and are quick to identify when anyone might be at risk of harm. Staff work closely with families to provide support.

Teachers have strong subject knowledge and know the needs of their pupils well. They create purposeful learning environments for pupils. Teachers also use a range of routines to help pupils learn.

Leaders have created a curriculum that is ambitious for all pupils. Leaders want all pupils to 'love to learn, learn to live and live to love'. Leaders use these values as the basis for curriculum design.

Staff say that leaders and those responsible for governance take their well-being seriously. They appreciate the care they receive, and the way leaders consider their workload.

Pupils feel safe at school. They are taught how to keep themselves safe online and in the community. They are confident that if they have a problem there will be someone to talk to and they will always receive help.



The organisation of tutor groups helps pupils to make friendships with pupils across the school. Because of this, pupils build strong relationships with their peers.

...there is very little bullying. When it does happen, staff deal with it quickly and effectively.

Reading is a priority for leaders. They have ensured that it is a feature in all subjects. As a result, pupils read widely and often.

Subject leaders have thought carefully about what pupils should know, do and understand in each subject. They have sequenced the curriculum to make sure that new knowledge builds on prior learning.

Year 5: Getting to school

New pupils and parents will have noticed how busy the pathways outside school can be. However, we know that as the weeks go on, fewer parents and carers meet their children at the school gates.

There are footpaths to our school from Morton Stanley Park. A crossing patrol operates at the lower end of Feckenham Road, while our Principal escorts children on the pedestrian crossing in front of school.

When pupils are ready for a bit of independence, consider letting them walk to your car at Morton Stanley Park.



Parking

We appreciate the additional road safety when the zig-zag lines are kept clear of parked cars at all times of the day. This is for the safety of our children as they cross the road, and for other car users

as they enter and exit the school site. Thank you for your consideration in this.

Can I please ask parents to park courteously and not to block driveways of our neighbours, nor to park on both sides of the road in the Scott Road cul-de-sac.

Some of the advice from Oxford Owl is

summarised here:

1. Keep reading to your child as long as possible

At this age, it is tempting to leave your child to get on with reading on their own. But hearing a story read to them is still very important for developing their comprehension. Here are a few reasons why:



- Hearing a story read out loud means that your child can have access to books that may as yet be too challenging to read alone. These challenging texts will help to develop their comprehension skills.
- Left to their own devices, your child might tend to pick lots of similar texts to read (for example, books from a favourite author or magazine). Reading aloud to your child gives you the opportunity to introduce them to books that they might not choose to pick up themselves, exposing them to a wider range of stories and types of text.
- Listening to an adult read gives a model for fluent reading. It allows your child to hear how a skilled reader uses expression, bringing the words on the page to life.
- Reading together gives your child time to discuss ideas and share opinions about what you're reading. This is great, as it helps children to think deeply about a text and practise explaining their opinions.

2. Listen to your child read


Even though your child is likely to be an independent reader by Year 5, it's still helpful to listen to them read. It means you can help them with unfamiliar words and talk together to make sure that they understand the book.

3. Read a wide variety of books

Encourage your child to choose texts with a variety of formats and layouts. Lots of children have favourite authors and genres, but it can be helpful to expand into new types of books every so often – and be sure not to neglect non-fiction texts, such as magazine articles, brochures, adverts, newspaper columns, signs, and notices.

Showing your child lots of kinds of texts will give them experience reading in a real-world context and will also prepare them for national assessments where they are expected to engage with a wide variety of text types. Make sure you talk together about how the texts are presented – the writing will look different depending on what type of text it is from.

Teaching groups and sets for 2023-24

Pupils attend the majority of their lessons in teaching groups. Teaching groups are mixed ability.

Sets for Maths, English and Science are organised according to teacher recommendations and analysis of pupils' performance during the last academic year. Pupils are placed in sets with others currently working at a similar ability stage to them. There may be movement between sets and teaching groups over the course of the year.

Teaching groups

Year 5 will be taught in six teaching groups. These groups are created based on information passed to us during our transition meetings with first schools.

Year 6, 7 and 8 will be taught in six teaching groups. From year to year, we do make changes to these with the pupils' learning at the heart of all decisions.

Teaching groups are called C1, C2, C3, E1, E2 and E3.

English and maths groups

Year 5 will be taught in their six mixed ability teaching groups initially. We will then use teacher assessment and GL data to organise them into seven groups. These will be comprised of a higher group, five mixed ability groups and a lower group. The whole year group will have maths and English at the same time.

Year 6 will be taught in seven groups. These will be comprised of a higher group, five mixed ability groups and a lower group. The whole year group will have maths and English at the same time.

For years 5 and 6, the seven maths and English groups will be named as follows:

Maths- Archimedes, Aristotle, Fibonacci, Newton, Pascal, Pythagoras, Turing.

English- Austen, Bronte, Dahl, Dickens, Orwell, Shakespeare, Shelley.

In both years 7 and 8, pupils will be split into two halves (c and e) and each side of the year will be taught in three ability groups, sets 1 to 3.

Science groups

Science groups have been arranged as follows:

Year 5 and 6 will be taught science in their mixed ability teaching groups.

Year 7 and 8 will be split into two halves (c and e) and each side of the year will be taught in ability sets 1-3.


Reading matters



A reminder to all our parents that students are expected to read for twenty minutes per evening at home, in order to help maximise their progress across all subject areas. Within the next few days, new pupils will be given a login to Accelerated Reader, our online reading platform, so that they quiz on the books they read at home. More information on this will follow; in the meantime, please continue to support your child by encouraging them to read at home daily for twenty minutes. A mixture of silent reading and reading aloud to an adult is perfect.

Each week, there is a word displayed here. If the pupils have a go at the tasks below linked to the weekly word, they will earn a point from their tutor. Once per fort-night the tutor will go through the previous two weeks' words and pupils will work collaboratively exploring their meanings, features and usage.
