Dear Parents and Carers,

We have continued to settle in to our new normal, embedding expectations with work and, more generally, around the school. Year 5 heard the bell for the first time this week as we had a fire drill, or rather, we had two at opposite ends of the day so that the two halves of the school - Years 5 and 7 as well as Years 6 and 8, were not on the playground at the same time. We always expect that children come out and line up promptly, sensibly and in silence, so allowing a register to be taken quickly.





Thank you for the nasal flu forms which have been coming in apace for Years 5 to 7. Just to make sure, I suggest you check at the bottom of your child's bag to ensure that it is not still there! There have been days when the post box has been very full, so that has been encouraging.

We have not forgotten about Year 8s: they have three lots of prospectuses from high schools today. As the 'rule of six' is in operation, open evenings are not possible, and different schools are offering different ways of getting information. The pupils have details from Tudor Grange Academy Redditch, Trinity High Schools and St. Augustine's Catholic High School. The booklets will begin the process for indicating high school preferences.



We shall be outlining our own approach to open evening in two weeks. The event is usually very popular indeed and a factor in decisions about middle school places for next September. Our surveys have always given a high recommendation rate from Walkwood parents and carers to their friends and family, and I hope you will feel able to speak honestly about your views if you are asked.

The main symptoms of coronavirus are:

- a high temperature this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

Most people with coronavirus have at least 1 of these symptoms.
